I volunteered with Hope Kolkata Foundation for almost a year and enjoyed every moment of it. Hope has several projects running simultaneously and I was lucky to have been a part of one such project namely "Nabadisha" under the supervision of Mrs. Gauri Pandit.

Children at Nabadisha are categorised into Formal and Non-Formal groups. Formal students are the ones who attend school and the non formal are the ones who do not go to school. My activities ranged from teaching Science and Mathematics, to helping them with home work, developing assessment modules for students and helping with occasional documentation work.

I interacted with different students from different backgrounds daily. While some of them were the most trying part of the job, some of them were also the most rewarding. I got to understand the joy and satisfaction of teaching new things, passing on the knowledge, boosting the confidence of the students by helping them solve a difficult math problem. I also realised how much patience it takes to work with little children. I had never volunteered as a teacher before, so in all this turned out to be a very enriching experience for me.

My time at Nabadisha left me with a much better understanding of the outlook these children have towards life – that is to never give up and be happy and positive despite difficult circumstances.

The protection homes run by the Hope Kolkata Foundation, strives to provide much needed care to abandoned children, runaways, orphans, victims of trafficking, children of sex workers, street and slum children who are vulnerable and at risk.

Before we take any child under our protection home, they are produced before the Child Welfare Committee as per the Juvenile Justice Act. All our protection homes are licensed by the Directorate of the Social Welfare, Government of West Bengal. The Protection Homes were set up to help the vulnerable street children of Kolkata and its adjoining districts.

We firmly believe in a child's right to a family and an enriched social life. Therefore we focus on "Extended Family Support" to build up on the confidence of the child. This unique feature of our support programme provides the child with a peaceful environment where his efforts are appreciated and he/she has a chance to grow in an environment free of abuse and violence. This also emphasises on a strong liaison and advocacy with our stakeholders, keeping them involved in our activities to bring a positive change in the life of a child.

What we do in our protection homes

- 24 hours protection in an environment filled with love and care, family like care given to children
- Access to formal school education and guidance support
- Nutritious meals
- Health care
- Counselling support for both the children and staff who are their care givers
- Recreational and cultural activities including dance, music, drawing/painting, violin, karate and swimming, sports activities like football and rowing
- Celebration of birthdays, religious festivals and other events
- Awareness on child rights and life skills trainings
- Developing livelihood skills for employment through trainings and job placements
- Empowering the family through livelihood training, medical support for parents and educational support for siblings
- Integration in the family

Kasba Girls Home

Kasba home, situated in the heart of Kolkata caters to girls below 14 years. This year we have supported 64 girls.

Achievements-

- 69 girls were successfully promoted to their next class in school.
- 12 girls have maintained Grade A (between 80 and 100) and 5 girls fell in Grade E (below 35).
- Special care was taken for the emotional well being of these girls. As a result, 128 group counselling session, 149 individual counselling sessions, and 69 play therapy sessions were conducted to help them deal with their traumas.
- Compared to last year we have 44 girls with appropriate BMI after proper healthcare and nutrition measures were taken throughout the year.
- Regular health check up was conducted for each girl and all have their individual medical files maintained.
- To ensure that these children have a say in their wellbeing and to promote the
 essence of democracy and leadership, two children's committees were set up
 in the home.
- Regular trainings on Child Rights and Child Protection were conducted for capacity development of the executive team.
- Regular parents meeting were conducted to make them aware about the need of education in life of these girls.

Success Story



This little girl came to Kasba Girls Home two years ago at the age of 6. Her father had committed suicide when she was only a baby and the health of her mother, who suffered from heart disease, deteriorated quickly, leaving young her alone to fend for herself. She was very shy when she first came to Kasba but has flourished remarkably since! Through intensive play therapies and counselling, she is now attending school and has made friends with everyone in the Kasba home. She loves to sing and draw. She started her formal education in class KG last year in a local English medium school and has excelled in her studies ever since. She recently participated in a debating competition in her school, receiving first prize for her argument and confidence. We look forward to see this young girl progress through Kasba Home's interventions.

Girl2B

The Girl2B home is located in a quaint locality in Tollygunge, Kolkata. The home provides holistic support to girls between 11 years and 18 years. However, under the G2B Empowerment Project, many girls who are above 18 years are placed in paying guest accommodations to support them while they pursue their dreams in their career and/or education. As a whole 32 girls are supported under the G2B Empowerment Project.

Achievements:

- 20 girls are pursuing their education from G2B home and 7 girls got admission in colleges.
- Total 10 girls are pursuing careers with vigour and supporting themselves and their families with their incomes.
- 12 girls were placed in paying guest to continue their education/ pursue their
 jobs without any interruptions. This was done keeping in mind that the girls
 are not left vulnerable once they are beyond the age limit of our protection
 home.
- In parents meetings or during individual interactions, the mothers of the girls
 have shown themselves to be very supportive of education and career for the
 girls. They have always enquired about the best interests of the girls and
 encouraged them to do better at every step.
- Supporting the families of the girls in dire situations is also necessary to enable them to lead health productive lives. Thus, one of the girl's mothers received medical support for her condition- Cervical adeno-carcinoma Type 2. This support will be continued till she is cured through radiation or through other appropriate procedures.

Success Story



Alpana (name changed) was enrolled in G2B in 2011 under the empowerment project. She had a dream of supporting her needy family which would only be plausible if she worked hard and became independent. Hard times had made the girl sad and miserable. However G2B stood by her during times of storm and helped her by providing her with all kinds of financial, educational, health, emotional and mental support. G2B restored her confidence and she worked hard to yield the perfect results. G2B also taught her the basic values and principles of life. She was staying as a paying guest in Sarojini as she was over 18. G2B provided her with food, clothing and medical expenses. She successfully completed classes 11 and 12 and went on to attend day-college at IGNOU with English Honours. Simultaneously, she wanted to work so we helped her getting vocational training. We are happy to say that now she works in a tea company at Big Bazaar and earns Rs.12, 000 per month which helps her support her family and keeps her satisfied

too. She is truly happy to be an independent woman, earning her own living. On 17th February 2016, Kalpana got married. We give Kalpana our constant support and wish she continues performing well in her life.

Ashar Alo

HOPE's first protection home was set up in Panditiya Place, Kolkata in 1999. Due to the increasing number of girls needing care and protection a new home was established in Madurdah Road, Kol-107, in March 2015 called Ashar Alo Home (Light of Hope). The girls previously residing in Panditya Girls Home and Howrah SEED Girls Home, who have attained the age of 14 years, moved to their new home in March 2015. As of April 2016, there are 40 in-house girls living at Ashar Alo.

Achievements:

- 22 girls reside in the Ashar Alo home, with a further 10 girls now living in independent hostels and 3 living in paying guest houses. All the girls receive continued support from HOPE regardless of their residence within or outside the Ashar Alo Home.
- As a result of consistent assessment and monitoring, in the past year 5 girls have been restored to their families. One girl has been placed in an institute that caters specifically for children with special needs.
- 32 girls in the home and hostel have been successfully promoted to their next class in formal school this year. Individual educational plans are designed and implemented for each girl.
- This year, we reached our target of 100% of our girls accessing education, supported by Ashar Alo Home. It is important to note that in India, class X is equivalent to Ireland's Junior Cert and class XII is equivalent to Ireland's Leaving Cert. Also the date of final year examinations in schools differ depending on the educational board they are affiliated to.
- The girls of Ashar Alo receive training on reproductive health, career

counselling and self-care to further enhance their skills and knowledge. One girl has completed training on basic computer applications at HOPE's Life skills Institute and other girls have now applied for computer training for the coming year.

• One girl from Ashar Alo was trained in hospitality in the HOPE Life skill Café. The Life skills Institute has admitted some of the girls in their new Beauty and Hairdressing course, which started in March 2016. One girl has also been successful in getting a minority scholarship of five thousand rupees for her education.

Success Story



Madhu (name changed), a resident of HKF Panditiya Home, has a great spirit and lots of ambition. She previously lived with her mother and step father in a Tollygunge Slum. Madhu's biological father left her and her mother when she was 7 years old. Madhu's mother was unable to take care of her child alone and worried about her protection and safety.

Madhu was placed in HOPE's protection home when she was 8. At 18, she is now studying in Class XI in Kasba Jagadish Vidyapith. She is a dedicated student and has shown a passion for art, especially painting. She is also a keen student of taekwondo and participated in competitions in the city, winning a Silver Medal in the district level championship in June 2015. Madhu has been promoted to Class XII and appeared in the Higher Secondary Board

Examination in 2016. She is also a talented dancer and performed in a Flash Mob event held at Quest Mall for HOPE's World day against Child Labour celebration and led the girls' dance group for our Women's Day Celebration.

Madhu has overcome the deprivations she faced as a young girl living in a large city slum and dreams of becoming a Police Officer.

CIC Female

This project provides a safe and protective environment to the girls who have not yet entered into adulthood and are in dire need of care and protection. It also ensures that a child's basic right to development, protection, participation and survival is not hindered.

Achievements

- In the last year, 7 girls were successfully sent to Inter Religious Centre of Development (ICOD) for their further rehabilitation, 2 girls with special need (visually impaired) were admitted to Louis Memorial School to provide them with professional support catering to their difficulties.
- 2 girls were restored with their family, follow up visits were conducted to check whether they continue to live in a safe environment or not.
- 4 children were restored to institutions like Kasba Girls' Home and All Bengal Women Union so that they receive all possible supports, care and protection.
- 3 families were helped to open their bank accounts and get their names enlisted in accidental life insurance scheme.
- During the reporting period, 4 children who were found to have inappropriate BMI have improved their BMI with the intervention of doctor and supply of nutritious food.

Ranjana (name changed) of Beleghata was admitted in CIC Female on 2nd Feb.2015 as per CWC order. The child was produced before CWC Kolkata by her mother Mrs. Shanti Das. She informed us that she has been living separately from her husband for the last one year, as her husband got married to her younger sister. After enrolment in CIC female a behaviour change was seen in Ranjana. She was not ready to stay in CIC female and wanted to go back to her mother. Even after several counselling sessions she didn't seem to want to stay. As a consequence gradually she started developing problems which affected her normal living. After family assessment and family counselling by the staff members, it was found that the child was affected because of the separation of parent and the father could be convinced to take Ranjana back to the family. Finally she was restored to the family and started to live happily with her father. Ranjana has been admitted in class II at Buniadi High school and regularly attends school.

Mother and Child Care Unit

MCCU is a short stay home for Mothers along with their children who are in crisis on the streets of Kolkata and in need of immediate care and protection. The programme provides for shelter, protection and rehabilitation through vocational training and education, to abandoned and neglected mothers and their children who have been found in distressing situations in the streets or on railway platforms of Kolkata.

Achievements:

- Last year 6 families were identified where the mothers and children could be restored after their families were deemed fit, post counselling. 14 follow up visits were also conducted to ensure their continued safety and provision of rights after restoration.
- 2 trainings on were provided to the staff to improve their child protective services.
- 8 trainings on Child Rights were provided to the children to empower them residing in MCCU.
- 2 trainings on Child Protection Policies were given to 9 staffs and 2 trainings on Child Rights were provided to 10 staffs. All of them have reported to have improved their knowledge on guidelines of CPP and CR at the end of the training.
- 6 Health Check Up were conducted in MCCU throughout the year and a total of 9
 mothers and 2 children successfully received medical care and treatment for
 their various chronic ailments.
- 2 children received education sponsorship and 1 child was provided with home-based educational support to ensure his retention in formal school.
- 2 children were placed to other organizations to cater to their special needs and treatment.
- 3 underweight children and 8 mothers were provided with supplementary nutrition to improve their BMI status.
- 5 mothers during the year successfully acquired vocational skills to enhance their livelihoods.

Success Story



Shefali (25 years) (name changed) and her daughter Asha (4 years) (name changed) were rescued from the streets of Kolkata and admitted to MCCU in April 2014. Shefali is both deaf and mute and we were therefore unable to get any information from her about her family background. The staff has come up with an innovative idea to counsel and support Shefali, through the use of picture cards, which is helping her greatly. Shefali shows great affection for her daughter, and is slowly becoming empowered to take good care of her. Asha entered MCCU at the tender age of 2, when she was found on the streets, heavily neglected and malnourished, as Shefali was unable to care for her, due to her disabilities. Asha is receiving non formal education in MCCU, until her spoken Bengali, reading and writing skills improves. She has now started school and really enjoys the little homework she gets every evening! Through intensive counselling and vocational support from MCCU, Shefali is now working as a school attendant and the two girls have moved into a

protective shelter, under the support and guidance of MCCU.

Ashirbad Boys' Home

The Ashirbad Boys Home is a residence for orphaned, abandoned and at high-risk boys, from broken or dysfunctional families. The current project focuses on strengthening the family of each boy through initial assessment to gauge gaps

to meet basic needs, providing vocational training to the boys and their adult family members. It also focuses on the regular follow up of the boys who have been restored to their families for the next 2 years.

Achievements:

- 3 families where identified and assessed to have safe and protective shelter for the restoration of the boys.
- 72 children were provided with education, nutrition, shelter, healthcare, counselling support and recreation for their overall development.
- Presently, there are 37 in-house children, 29 staying at a school hostel, 3 have been placed in outside protective shelters and 7 boys receive home-based educational support
- 9 new children were enrolled through the Child Welfare Committee to Ashirbad last year.
- 2 trainings on Child Protection Policies and 1 training on Child Rights were conducted for the Ashirbad's staff last year which enhanced the staff's knowledge about child handling and child care
- 3 safe-guarding committee meetings were held in Ashirbad last year to ensure the continued delivery of child safety and protection.
- 8 children have improved their underweight status with the help of supplementary nutrition.

- Throughout the year, 59 boys who received medical care have been successfully cured of their ailments.
- 1 boy received non-formal education, 1boy received vocational training from Ashirbad and 1 boy who belonged to a minority community was enrolled in a Minority scheme in Churches of North India School.
- 19 children have improved behavioural status after several counselling sessions based on behavioural parameters
- 13 in-house children and 18 hostel children are receiving midday meal services from their local Government School under the Sarva Shiksha Avijan scheme.
- 3 boys have been enabled to apply for their Unique Identification Number, which will enhance their access to Government services.
- 1 child received a residential certificate with the help of a local councillor and this certificate can be used as an identity card which will also enable him to open a savings account.

Success Story



Md. Alam (name changed) was treated in HOPE Hospital when he was 9 years old, after the Missionaries of Charity, a local NGO in Kolkata, discovered him living on the streets of Kolkata with little shelter, food and clothing. Post recovery and after the death of his grandmother he was admitted to Ashirbad Boys Home. While a relative was traced after placing his photograph and details with the missing squad of the Kolkata Police, they were not able to take his responsibility, as they are below the poverty-line. Md. Alam therefore entered Ashirbad. He is studying in Class IV in Tollygunge Bangur School and this year he was promoted to class five and secured 1st position in his class. He has a creative mind, likes drawing and competed in a competition organised by The Bengal Chamber of Commerce and Industry Kolkata. Md. Alam also has a green belt in karate and can always been seen in Ashirbad practising his karate moves!

Be Kind Boys' Home

Be-kind is a home for vulnerable boys stemming from the streets and slums of Kolkata who were forced to survive without their basic human rights, some of whom are orphaned, abandoned. Last year, 21 children benefited from the work of this home and were provided with education, nutrition, recreational and other necessary support for their care and protection. The children of this home come from adjacent districts of Kolkata like South 24 Parganas, North 24 Parganas and Howrah.

Achievements:

- All 21 children (20 living in the protection home and 1 living with his family) are receiving formal education, attend school regularly and receive additional tuition.
- Individual educational plans are designed and implemented for each boy.
- The boys participate in a variety of sports and recreational activities throughout the year, including karate and dancing which help in their holistic development. Two boys came 1st in a local drawing competition.
- To help the boys develop confidence and independence, the boys participate in monthly children's' committee

meetings with the staff.

- Health camps were conducted with all 20 children receiving general, dental and eye check-ups. Individual medical files are also kept for all of the boys and
- a doctor from HOPE Hospital has been assigned to BeKind Boys, who weekly attends the home and conducts checkups of the boys.
- Psychological support has been provided through play sessions, group and individual counseling sessions, to the children who need it.
- Last year, 1 child received his Unique Identification Number or Adhar Card and 2 children received Below Poverty Line or BPL cards.

Success Story



Sayan (name changed), 8 year old, lived with his parents and three siblings in their native village of Bihar. His father was an alcoholic who physically abused his wife and children. Sayan's mother fled with her children to Kolkata where they started living on the platforms of Sealdah station. The HKF night watch team rescued the family and they were admitted to the Mother and Child Care Unit for short-term and protective shelter. As Sayan's mother was unemployed and unable to take care of the children, he was placed in Be-kind home and his two elder sisters in the Kasba Home. His mother is now working as an ayah in HOPE Hospital and the youngest sister, a toddler, remains with her. Sayan is a well behaved boy, maintains good relationships with teachers and peers, participates in class activities and demonstrates leadership skills. He is a bright eager student, grasps concepts easily and has an affinity for Maths. Last year Sayan achieved 64% and was promoted to Class-II, at Silver Point Primary school.

Crisis Intervention Centre - Male

The aim of this project is to ensure the holistic development of vulnerable young males rescued from the street by providing them with protective shelter, healthcare, nutrition, education, counselling, recreation and a family environment with love and care for their overall development.

Achievements:

- Last year, 12 families where identified and assessed through home visits to have safe and protective shelter for the restoration of the boys.
- 18 follow-up visits have been conducted by CIC case and social workers to ensure the continued provision of a safe shelter and basic rights of each of the boys' restored home
- 3 children were enrolled in formal school this year and 16 children continue to receive educational sponsorship through CIC male.
- 9 children are staying in the protective shelter home of ICOD and receiving all their necessary supports for their further rehabilitation and holistic development. All the children have access to ICOD's special educator and engage in life skill classes. 1 child is staying in Rajapur Seva Niketan.
- 4 trainings on Child Protection Policies were conducted for the CIC staff to enhance their knowledge about child handling and child care.
- 6 trainings on Child Rights were successfully provided to the children to make them aware of their rights.
- Last year, 3 health check-ups were conducted successfully for the boys in CIC male, including dental and eye check ups
- 39 groups counseling sessions, 17 play therapy sessions and 38 individual counseling sessions took place in CIC Male
- 118 recreational activities such as sporting events, training, local outings and picnics were organised which the boys enjoyed a lot.

Success Story



Sanjay (name changed) entered HOPE's CIC Male home in July 2015, after Childline discovered him living on the streets of Kolkata with little care. He was neglected and at high-risk of ill-health and all sorts of abuse. Sanjay used to live with his father and grandmother. But as he suffers from multiple disabilities, the family could not afford his medical treatment. In the CIC home, Sanjay received health and medical support alongside play therapy and counselling sessions. CIC Male staff has also worked with Sanjay's family relentlessly to highlight the importance of providing care and protection to him. After several home assessments were conducted, Sanjay's home environment was deemed safe for his restoration. Sanjay continues to receive home-based education support from CIC Male. Through networking and advocacy he has received a Disability Certificate, which has enabled him to enrol in Government-run vocational training and has opened up many Government schemes and entitlements for him, and his family.

Punorjibon

Punorjibon is a rehabilitation home for reformed, addicted orphans or runway boys who are rescued from Howrah railway station area but in actual belongs to various district of West Bengal and its neighbouring states. Under this project, the beneficiaries are placed in a detoxification programme followed by admission to formal schools where they are given vocational skills training and a job placement.

Achievements:

- In this year, 8 boys have been successfully promoted to the next class including one who has cleared the Madhyamik Examination.
- 3 boys have been placed under Life Skill Training Unit for Vocational Training. One of them is receiving training on Laundry skills and is willing to take it as his livelihood option in the near future.
- 12 boys have been enrolled in a football coaching centre with an intention to channelize their positive energy into sports as well as encourage these boys to have sports as an optional career.
- 3 boys were helped to receive their disability certificates and related scholarship under West Bengal Board of Primary Education.
- The boys have been provided with computers inside the home premises so that they can learn using it. The boys are also encouraged to use this knowledge in their future as well.
- Regular checkups of the children are conducted. 2 boys have received treatment for chronic illness such as tuberculosis and Thalassemia and have recovered well.
- A knowledge sharing session had conducted on child sexual abuse to make the
 boys more aware of it and its adverse effects on one's mental and physical health. The session also intended to
 provide an assertive training to the children in response to such incidents as well.

Success Story



Tapan (name changed) was diagnosed as a slow learner and did not adjust in school. He also had to face unpleasant incidents and was victimized by his school peer groups and their guardians as well. As a result he lost interest in education and slowly stopped going to school regularly. He shared that he wanted to discontinue school and take up vocational training to be able to earn his own livelihood in future. Seeing his interest in cooking, he was enrolled in Life Skill Unit's chef's section on October, 2015. His supports provision was also planned in such a way that he can continue his training in life skill and learn to be a successful Chef. Presently he has successfully completed his chef's training and is looking forward to start a career in that field. He is also motivated to continue non-formal education, at least till class VIII so as to ensure he can further upgrade his training in the future.

Education in School

The findings of the ASER (Annual Status of Education Report) in West Bengal shows that children are well below their standard level in arithmetic and reading comprehension, both in English and mother tongue like Bengali or Hindi. This annual survey that aims to provide reliable annual estimates of children's schooling status and basic learning levels for each state and rural district in India has been conducted every year since 2005.

Our Holistic Education Programme was envisaged to provide underprivileged and/or marginalised children falling in the age group of 3-18 years to ensure their basic educational needs rooting from the constitutional Right to Education.

The programme has five major components that are closely connected for a holistic effect on the lives of these children:

- Education
- Health
- Gender
- Community Mobilisation
- Capacity Building

The aim of the programme is to help children with learning difficulties by strengthening school education system in West Bengal. The entire project is spread across north Kolkata, south Kolkata and Howrah (municipality and rural)

The overall objectives of the Holistic Education Programme are:

- Educating under privileged children aged between 3 and 5 years through early intervention
- Providing best support to the disadvantaged students from marginalised communities.
- Organising campaigns in communities with focus on need of education and right to education.
- Organising awareness programmes on various entitlements made available by the government and how to secure them.
- Awareness generation on child protection, importance of nutrition
- Creating space and opportunities for children to explore their hobbies, interests and potential

Achievements (In South Kolkata)

- HKF enrolled 43 children who have never-been-to school or had earlier dropped-out from school through 43 home visits, 10 meetings with schools and several awareness camps and motivation.
- In all 3 schools, formal school teachers have started to successfully implement CCE (Continuous and comprehensive evaluation) in a more constructive manner by using Teaching and Learning methodology (TLM) for teaching, which was introduced to them through HKF's Froebel methodology training sessions.
- While 75 children have showed significant improvement in qualifying learning levels (according to ASER Tool). Others have shown improvement in intermediate levels.
- 29 Peer group members have been trained on the fundamental rights (right to survival, right to development, right
 to protection and right to participation) and have thus developed the knowledge and confidence to take on the
 responsibility of training fellow students on these basic rights through 11 trainings organized for other schools and
 attended by 383 students.
- 2 special need children are taking required therapy from relevant institutions. They have shown some progress in their educational outcomes, confidence level, socialisation skills, communication skills and activities of daily living.

Achievements (North Kolkata)

- Enrolled 291 children who have never-been-to school or had earlier dropped-out from school through awareness
 camps and motivation. HKF was also able to track 188 irregular students and motivate them to attend school
 regularly.
- In all 7 school's formal school teachers have started to implement CCE in a more constructive manner by using Teaching and Learning methodology (TLM) for teaching, which was introduced to them through HKF's Froebel methodology training sessions. Last year, 31 teachers used CCE for all subject and 34 teachers used game /TLM during teaching. 35 formal school teachers started to use Froebel Methodology and TLM during their teaching.
- Overall 170 Children have showed significant improvement in the qualifying learning levels (according to ASER
 Tool) from their individual base levels. Others have shown improvement in intermediate levels. Some of the
 students who were below the basic level and not interested in studies are now showing more confidence and
 better, participation levels.
- 65 Peer group members have been trained on the fundamental rights (right to survival, right to development, right to protection and right to participation) and have thus developed the knowledge and confidence to take on the responsibility of training fellow students on these basic rights through 20 trainings organized for other schools and attended by 636 students.

 4 special need children are taking required therapy from relevant institutions. They have shown good progress in their educational outcomes, confidence level, socialisation skills, communication skills and activities of daily living.

Howrah

The holistic education programme in Howrah is a standalone project run under the aegis of education programme executed by Hope Kolkata Foundation. The project is implemented in Howrah. The team of HKF is working in 4 formal schools in three operational areas (Howrah- Bhagar, Shalimar and Chunabhatti). Shalimar, Chunabhatti falls under Podra and Panchayet and Bhagar falls under Howrah Municipality Ward no.8 and Bally Municipality Ward No. 35.

One of the highlights of the education programme in Howrah is the sponsorship programme for Bhagar where about 60 children are given direct support to help them to continue with their formal education. The children were identified along with other dropouts and/or potential dropouts through a random survey conducted in November, 2015. As sponsored children, they are provided with annual school fees, school dress and shoes, education materials and a supplementary nutrient pack.

Achievements:

- Enrolment of 243 drop out and out of school children (aged between 6-14 years) were done in 3 institutions in the operational areas. 4 special need students were enrolled in school. 92 irregular students started attending school regularly.
- 65% teachers (combined percentage of 3 schools) are now using CCE for all subject and 69% teachers are using game /TLM during teaching.
- In the reporting period 72 slow learner students showed progress.
- After corporal punishment complaints were registered by parents and children, HKF staff motivated4 teachers to start practicing positive reinforcement in classes. HKF has plans to take this as an example with other schools in other operational areas.
- 3 new libraries were set up in the formal schools where 527 students are using the library for 1 hour every week.
- Only 1 school maintains a barrier free environment. 5 special need children so far has received disability certificate. 6 special need children are taking required therapy from relevant institutions and have showed some progress in their educational outcomes, confidence level, socialisation skills, communication skills and activities of daily living. 2 teachers are now using special teaching aids to teach special need children.
- 24 parents attending School Management Committee (SMC) meeting. Among them (Male-parents-25, women parents-19, School teacher-29, Minority group members-28, Local authorities-24, Academicians/Students-19) participated in that. However only 1 school has a functional SMC.

Success Story



Ratna (name changed) is a student in Ratnakrishna Sishu Primary School. Her father Nemai Pramanik is a daily labourer and mother Rina Pramanik is a house wife. They lived in Panditya Place. Ratna was not interested in going to school; moreover her parents had no time to take care of her. She used to roam around all day and play with her friends, thereby exposing herself to potential abuse and threats. Even while she attended school, she was found to be a reserved student. Our team started to interact with her and slowly she opened up to the teachers without hesitation. She also started taking interest in coming to school regularly. The teachers of HKF visited her home and spoke to her parents. As a result they started taking interest in her

academics. With support from HKF she found it within her to overcome her shortcomings. Nowadays, she listens to her teachers attentively and slowly and tries to complete her homework without any mistakes.

Success Story



Rakesh Roy (name changed) is a student of Srima Prabeshikalaya, Nimtala. He suffers from mild autism and rarely attended school as he was always restless in the classroom. To ensure that young Rakesh continue his studies and have access to a quality education, the special educators from HKF started to use TLM materials such as functional words, communications and picture words and applied behavioural management techniques such as rhyming and bindi pasting which significantly enhanced his interest in school. Since the HKF interventions, Rakesh regularly attends school, has made many friends in his class and has a new passion for creative writing.

Nirmal Vidyalaya Award, Chitpur (Kolkata - North)

The Nabadwip Roy Smirty Prathamick School in Chitpur was declared a model school by the Department of School Education, Government of West Bengal and received the Nirmal Vidyalaya award. This is a very prestigious award, which highlights the successes of the school in terms of:

- The usage of TLM and maintenance of CCE for all students
- Collaboration among teachers and parents for the enrolment and retention of children in the school, through home visits of irregular students
- Teachers actively working against corporal punishment and regular meetings among teachers and parents to discuss child's progress
- Child-friendly environment within the school in terms of art work, positive reinforcement posters and stimulating decorations
- Establishment and regular usage of school library
- The school is currently 80% barrier free for special needs students
- We are very proud to be working in collaboration with the Nabadwip Roy Smirty Prathamick School, and hope to utilize this model school as an example of how we will work with other schools throughout Kolkata and Howrah for the most effectively collaborations and delivery of high-quality education.





Rohan (name changed) is a boy of 13 years. His father is a daily wage earner and his mother earns a meager income by stitching clothes from home. Rohan was forced to leave his education due to poverty. When Rohan was identified from community as a dropout, HKF teachers spoke to him and found him interested in pursuing his studies and ready to enroll again in formal school. HKF team interacted with his parents and he was able to get readmitted in a school. The problem faced by Rohan was that he left studies six months back and was finding it difficult to catch up with his studies. HKF teachers helped him by providing support. In the annual examination of class VII he secured second position in his class. He has regained faith in his abilities and looks forward to continue with his education.



Muktangan (CSR initiative by CESC)

Hope Kolkata Foundation (HKF) started implementing the Muktangan project from September 2015. The Project was scaled to 15 centres (10 centres in Budge Budge and Pujali and 5 centres in Titagarh). The classes are held for two hours, five days a week in school premises with special emphasis on Maths, Science and English for the children of class VIII to X. The Project was initiated with the objective of providing remedial education to children from disadvantaged backgrounds to prevent drop out and improve school enrolment.

Certain criteria are looked into before enrolling students to the coaching centre:

- Children are good in studies but have a family income of lower than Rs.60,000/- per year,
- or they do not have father as the earning member of the family
- if the parents of the child is handicapped or is a first generation learner and there is lack of parental guidance at home
- If the child is orphan or single parent or children who are identified as slow learner through ASER test.

The children are assessed through the slow learner identification test called the ASER test (Annual status of Educational Report) on a bi-annual basis in Maths, English and Language. Tests are taken to track the progress on quarterly basis on the subjects that are taught in the centre.



In the year 2015-2016 total 65 children appeared for the Madhyamik examination (Class X) from Titagarh, Budge Budge and Pujali. From Pujali total 16 children (4 male, 12 female) appeared and 14 of them successfully cleared the exam, from Budge Budge 41 children (18 male, 23 female) appeared for the exam and all of them successfully cleared it. From Ttagarh 8 children (2 male, 6 female) appeared for the examination and all of them got successfully promoted to the next class.

Parents Committee are formed in each field consisting of 41 members (Titagarh 15, Budge Budge 15 and Pujali 11) who are trained on regular basis on social issues like Right to Education Act 2009 so that these parents can identify any dropout or children who have never been to school and refer them to the Muktangan project. This selection is done on the basis of regularity in parents meeting, being vocal and having leadership quality.

Activities:

- Parents meeting: During the reporting period four parents meetings were conducted in the schools in Budge Budge and Pujali and Titagarh. On an average 405 parents attended the meeting. In Budge Budge 23% were male and 77% were females. In Pujali 35% are male and 65% are females. And in Titagarh 27% are males and 73% are females.
- Home visit: During the reporting period total 513 home visits were done in Budge Budge, 190 in Pujali and 331 in Titagarh. The purpose of the home visits are to motivate and encourage irregular children to come to the centre.
- Community meeting: In June and July 2016 two Community meetings were conducted, each in Budge Budge, Titagarh and Pujali. Total participants were 163. In Budge Budge there were 35 participants (1 male and 34 female), 42 in Pujali (19 male and 23 females) and 86 in Titagarh (26 males and 60 females). The meeting was done to identify dropouts, children who have never been to school and to spread awareness on Right to Education.
- Peer Group meeting: During the reporting period four meetings were conducted with the Peer group members on Health and Hygiene, Child Rights, Addiction and Right to Education mandate. Through pre and post assessment tests, the following was found out:

- Training by Peer Educators: Peer educators are 144 children who are trained on regular basis on social issues like Health and Hygiene, Child Rights, Addiction, Right to Education mandate so that these children can give trainings to other children of the formal schools. There are 144 such children (Titagarh-44, Budge Budge 70 and Pujali 30) who are selected on the basis of regularity in the centre, being vocal and leadership quality. In May 2016, 5 peer educators facilitated training on Health and Hygiene. The training was given to 20 children (12 male and 8 female) of Titagarh Arya Vidyalaya, Titagarh Upendra Bhanja Vidyapith, Siddheswari U.P.Vidyalaya, Titagarh Pour Madhyamik Vidyalaya and Titagarh Pour Balika Vidyalaya.
- Formal School Teachers Training: Two formal school teachers trainings were conducted in the month of June and August 2016, on Activity Based Learning and Positive Reinforcement. In June, 26 teachers attended the training from Badamtala High School (Budge Budge) and 20 teachers from Titagarh Arya Vidyalaya (Titagarh). In August, 27 teachers attended the training from Rajibpur High School (Pujali) and 15 teachers from Upendra Bhanja Vidyapith (Titagarh). Through pre and post assessment tests, it was found that the teachers significantly increased their knowledge on the above mentioned topic. The teachers also received certificate for participating in the training sessions.
- Career Guidance Counselling: In May 2016, a Career Guidance Counseling was done by Mr. Bubai Das, having expertise as a mentor in Preparatory Stage for Entrance Exams. Total 57 children (20 male and 37 female) attended the session from Budge Budge, Titagarh and Pujali. It was held in Kalipur High School. As per the feedback of the children, the sessions were very fruitful as it cleared their doubts regarding choosing of different streams (Science, Commerce or Humanities).





Nabadisha

Hope Kolkata Foundation runs the Nabadisha-Project with the help of Kolkata Police. It serves nutrition and educational needs to the underprivileged children of specified areas. Under this partnership, Kolkata Police provides place and infrastructure along with few health supports and HOPE Kolkata Foundation provides all other right based supports. Currently Hope Kolkata is implementing four Nabadisha centers in different parts of Kolkata. They are:

- · Gariahat Nabadisha
- Topsia Nabadisha
- Tollygunge Nabadisha
- New Market Nabadisha

The children in Gariahat come mainly from ward no. 68 and 86 of Kolkata Municipal Corporation, (KMC), Gariahat Bazaar area and from the slum areas near Garcha. The main occupation of the families are daily wage labourers,

domestic workers, construction workers and rag pickers. They are generally deprived of the basic necessities like shelter, proper nutrition however some do have accessto toilets and drinking water provided by Kolkata Municipal Corporation (KMC). Migration and eviction are major problems for this population.

Children coming to Topsia centre are also from slums where about 8000 people live and the primary livelihood of the families are vending and selling different types of goods. People in Topsia have access to toilets and drinking water facilities, provided by KMC.

The children in Tollygunge come mainly from three areas under KMC Ward number

88. Toilets, drinking water service and electricity are provided to the slums through KMC. The main occupation of the people here are day labourers and domestic helpers.

The children in New Market Nabadisha are coming mainly from 3 wards- 51, 52 and 46. 30% of the population of New Market area belongs to the minority community. People here mainly work as cobblers, shop keepers, plumbers, domestic worker and rag pickers. Migration and eviction is a major problem in New Market.

The three main outcome of the Nabadisha project are as follows -

- Ensuring educational support to children living on the streets of Kolkata, by mainstreaming them to formal school, hostel or providing them with informal education and skill training.
- Ensuring cultural and emotional development of the children living difficult circumstances.
- Increased awareness in the community regarding the rights of the children with special emphasis on street children and children living in difficult circumstance.

Achievements:

Formal Education:

- Last year, total 195 slums and street children (46 Topsia, 40 Gariahat, 47 Tollygunge and 62 New Market) were enrolled in formal schools from Nabadisha project. 96% children enrolled have been attending school regularly.
- 91 children were successfully promoted to the next class with 76 of them (30 New Market and 46 Tollygunge) securing more than 60% marks.
- 30 children (13 boys and 17 girls) have been provided with hostel support, 2 from Topsia and 28 from Gariahat. They
 are placed in various hostels throughout Kolkata like Lee Collins, Don Bosco, Ashalayam, Mass Education and CNI
 Girls Hostel.
- An important aspect of the centre is having play sessions, both indoor and outdoor, for the children. Indoor games
 include carom, chess, block games, etc. 20 play sessions were arranged (10 in Topsia and 10 in Gariahat) where 73
 children participated.

Nutrition and hygiene

- Hygiene practice sessions are done once a week where practices like cutting nails, washing hands before eating are encouraged. In all 45 Hygiene Practice and Check Up sessions were conducted.
- Hygiene kits were provided which contained combs, anti-septic cream, hand-wash and nail-cutters.

Non-Formal Education:

- The Nabadisha provides non-formal education to a total of 33 children (15 Topsia, 19 Tollygunge, 18 New Market and 18 Gariahat) from streets and slums.
- 43 children were mainstreamed to formal school from the non-formal unit. 55 new admissions (25 Topsia and 30 Gariahat) were also done. Attendances of these children were taken regularly.
- In Tollygunge and New Market, 73 Individual Counseling Session was conducted and 161 Group Counseling Session where 827 children participated. 28 family counseling sessions were done and 57 family members attended it. In these sessions the participants can speak freely and share their problems without any hesitation.
- The teachers use the Child Centric Methodology (Froebel Methodology) to teach in the centre. They are also trained using the strategy of 'activity based teaching, which helps the children understand better.
- 74 play sessions were arranged in both centers and 63 children attended that. These sessions along with education help in the holistic development of the children.
- 8 Awareness Camps were organised in the community, 362 people attended the Awareness Camps. It was reported that 128 people increased their knowledge level (through pre & post test).
- 99 visits to formal school (60 for Topsia and 39 for Gariahat) and 60 visits to various hostels where Nabadisha children are placed were done to sensitize the formal school teachers and hostel authorities. 53 visits were done to police stations by Nabadisha staffs to increase the involvement of police in this project and also for strengthening the existing network.

Child Development Khazana:

Child Development Khazana (CDK) is an initiative by Butterflies that organizes and empowers street children and encourages them to have a savings for themselves. It teaches the children to priorities needs, budget, save and manage money. The CDK members have also formed Child Health Cooperative (CHC) that encourage the functioning of Child Health Educators and facilitates participation of street children in asserting their right to health care. Till October, 2015 there have been 41 CDK members in Topsia and 47 in Gariahat. Due to new financial policy of the government the project is not running at present.

88 children saved money under Children Development Khazana Program (CDK) program and the total amount of savings done is Rs. 11,509 in all the Nabadisha centres.

Success Story



This 15 year old boy lives with his physically challenged father at Topsia. His mother passed away two years ago. When he came into contact with the teachers of Topsia Nabadisha Centre he was not attending school. But later was motivated and admitted to a formal school in 2006. He is very studious, comes regularly to Nabadisha for coaching support and has received a scholarship of Rs 2000/- from RICE Group. This scholarship is for meritorious and underprivileged students which will help them in buying text books, a new school uniform and shoes as well as motivate them to complete their education successfully. The scholarship also encouraged him to continue to work hard and focus on his studies.

Success Story



Bikash (name changed) lives with his family in New Market and studies at Indira Academy. He is the 1st generation learner of his family. His father is a cobbler and his mother is a daily wage labour. The family lives on the roof of a very old house by making a temporary structure of plastic. About 60 families also live there along with them. In spite of many difficulties Bikash is a meritorious student. When the Nabadisha team had identified him, he was a drop-out. Teachers of Nabadisha motivated him to continue his study and assured help and guidance for his education. He and his family were motivated to Bikash admitted in a formal school. Now for the past two years he has been successfully continuing with his school (English Medium). He receives regular guidance from centre teachers and this year he topped his class and received the award for the best student of the year. He is very happy and encouraged and has promised to get more marks and more awards in future.

Education Sponsorship

The Hope Foundation has runs sponsorship program for the street and slum children. The children are provided formal education support, hostel care support, nutrition, psychological counselling, health support and vocation training. To reduce gender disparities, project gives preference to girl child and nearly 50% of the total beneficiaries under the sponsorship project are girls.

Froebel HOPE Teacher Education Partnership



In its 9th year, the Froebel HOPE Teacher Education Partnership has brought up to 200 newly qualified teachers from Ireland to Kolkata for five-week periods to co-teach with their Bengali teaching colleagues across HOPE Education centres and state schools. An incremental increase in the uptake of HOPE teachers to state school positions has been reported annually since 2015, recognising the success implementation of a Froebelian play based approach and the experience and skill of HOPE teachers in supporting children's individual learning difficulties and needs. The

support of three Education Coordinators of the Froebel HOPE Partnership has been instrumental to all progress made.

- Hope Kolkata Foundation has been working in health sectors since 2007 as it is a fundamental component for the holistic development of the communities. HKF has worked in 21 slums of Kolkata and Howrah focusing on the delivery of primary healthcare to the slum dwellers, generating community awareness and empowering the community to access their entitlements and rights. To ensure the sustainability of our primary healthcare programme and to continue to create an environment of empowerment within local communities, HKF conducted a Situational Analysis of its healthcare programme in 2014. Three major health concerns were revealed as prominent issues in each of the communities which have become the focus of this year's primary healthcare programme.
- Post natal care (PNC): 83% of mothers in the surveyed population were unable to gain access to PNC. This limited or non-existent PNC access increased the possibility of mortality and morbidity among mothers, alongside the absence of adequate family planning measures. The Auxiliary Nurse Midwife's (ANM) are expected to follow-up cases after delivery and ensure the mother is accessing PNC services, but this Government service is severely lacking in all areas.
- Reproductive Tract Infection (RTI) and Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STD): Large numbers of youth and
 adolescents suffer from STD/ RTI symptoms, which have resulted due to lack of knowledge and awareness
 surrounding safe sex practices, stigma associated with such infections and lack of accessible healthcare facilities.
 Government-run Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS) has also failed in one of their main objectives of
 catering for adolescent female health in this area.
- Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS): HKF's Situational Analysis identified that 20% of children and 27% of adolescents from the designated areas were not enrolled in the ICDS centres, and those enrolled are not able to access all the services that ICDS should be providing. We have also discovered that the demand for ICDS services outweighs the numbers of centres, leaving many children and adolescents deprived of services. Those communities with access to ICDS centres often find the services inadequate due to lack of staff and resources, poor quality and low maintenance of centres and lack of home visits conducted.

Health

The aim of the programme is to addressing Health Issues of women, children & adolescents from the marginalized slums of Kolkata. The entire project is spread across north Kolkata, south Kolkata and Howrah (municipality and rural).

Achievements: South

- 10 Community Health Volunteers (CHVs) from each field are in regular contact with ICDS centers to enhance the
 quality of service delivery within these centres. The CHV's also meet with Aneshwa Clinic staff to promote their
 work relating to RTI/STD treatment in the slums.
- Through several awareness camps, home visits and information dissemination, gradually 1st and 2nd PNC are being taken up by lactating mothers at Government Hospitals. Of the total 25 lactating mothers identified, 15 1st PNCs have been facilitated, 14 2nd PNCs have been facilitated and 25 4th PNCs have been facilitated.
- RTI/STD: Networking, awareness camps, collaboration with Suraksha Clinic and Anwesha Clinic by HKF workers have led to ensure full testing and treatment of RTI/STD by Government hospitals.
- The HKF CHVs have revealed that the communities' children are now regularly attending ICDS centres and are availing of the ICDS services of pre-primary education, growth monitoring, supplementary nutrition and immunization.


Health.

Achievements: North

- Around 10 active, hardworking Community Health Volunteers (CHVs) from each field are in regular contact with ICDS centers- (meeting with ICDS teachers for the betterment of the ICDS services).
- In all operational areas, pregnant and lactating mothers and their families have begun to realize the value of institutional delivery, due to frequent home visits and small pocket meetings done. Of the total 25 lactating mothers identified, 15 1st PNCs have been facilitated, 14 2nd PNCs have been facilitated, 13 3rd PNC have been facilitated and 25 4th PNCs have been facilitated.
- After establishing some meaningful networking with Suraksha clinic and Anwesha Clinic (regarding adolescent health, safe sex practices) 4 camps were conducted which helped to identify RTI & STD patients.
- 4 Center of ICDS have started to provide ARSH (Adolescent Reproductive and Sexual Health) training for the adolescent girls.

Achievements: Howrah

- 10 Community Health Volunteers (CHVs) from each field are active and are in regular contact with ICDS centers to
 enhance the quality of service delivery within these centres. The CHV's also meet with Aneshwa Clinic staff to work
 on RTI/STD treatment in the slum communities.
- Networking conducted with workers of the local health centres and hospitals have focused on ensuring all women avail of 3rd and 4th PNC. CHVs have also started to accompany lactating mothers to their PNC checks, to ensure full PNC is conducted.
- The local Anwesha centre has conducted 20 educational camps in the areas in collaboration with Howrah State General Hospital thus enhancing the local centre's delivery of ARSH training for adolescent girls.
- CHVs are highly motivated and help to indentify and provide guidance to RTI/STI patients. They ensure their access to healthcare facilities; broaden their knowledge on safe sex practice


Accessing health services for those living below the poverty line in Kolkata remains difficult, with India only spending

only 4.2% of its national GDP on healthcare services. The Hope Hospital was envisaged to ensure proper medical care for the under privileged people below the poverty line who are otherwise deprived of proper medical care they deserve. The hospital boasts of an inpatient department with Intensive Care Unit, and outpatient department a surgery unit and a diagnostics Centre.

Inpatient Ward

The Inpatient Wards provide quality care, diagnosis, treatment and medication under very hygienic conditions to children and adult patients.

Achievements

- As a part and continuous effort of network activities, Hope Hospital is connected with different N.G.Os. Volunteers from various organizations from different countries and the local community provide their services and care to patients. The hospital established a platform for mutual sharing and facilities and allows more space and opportunities for complete care and rehabilitation of the poor patients who are homeless. In the last year, network with the following six charities were successfully established:
 - 1. Jishu Ashram, Siliguri, Matigara.
 - 2. Silesian of Don Bosco, Kolkata.
 - 3. New Age Society for All, Kolkata
 - 4. Nimyle Home For Challenged Children
 - 5. St. George School, Br. Kristopher, Kolkata
 - 6. Christanjali Paribar, Kolkata.
- This year we have successfully provided medical and health support to 10, 528 people at the Hope Hospital.
- A total of 481 surgeries were performed.
- Govt. of India renewed the Rastriya Swasthya Bima Yojna, a project for treating the BPL (Below Poverty Level) people at free of cost in Hope Hospital after successful completion of one year agreement.
- There was 35 % increase in Inpatient department at the Hope Hospital during the period of April 2015 March 2016 as compared to the last year.

Hope Hospital

- 1 advanced training was successfully organised on Infection Prevention and Use of Suture for the Nurses and ward staffs of Hope Hospital to enhance their skills by Johnson & Johnson company on 26.06.2015.
- 515 RTI/STI symptomatic people were identified and referred to government hospitals for testing and treatment. Out of them 222 people were tested positive and recovered successfully after treatment.
- 137 people who were identified to be affected with mental health issues were provided with medical and counselling support. Out of them 41 successfully recovered and have attained jobs.
- 457 people were rescued and admitted to Hope Hospital for treatment by volunteers and other NGO's.
- 27 homeless and abandoned patients, both male and female were rehabilitated from the Hope Hospital during this year.

Success Story



This 12 year old boy from Bihar was rescued from Howrah Station. He had come to Kolkata to visit his aunt at Mallik Bazaar but ended up roaming and begging at Howrah Station before the Night Round team rescued him. He was weak, thin and in a very serious physical condition so the team admitted him at Hope Hospital on 21.4.2015. After a thorough check-up it was revealed that he had Diabetes and his blood sugar level was as high as 500mu. At Hope Hospital his treatment started to get his sugar level under control. He said that he wanted to go to his aunt's house because that his parents knew that he was there. One day the boy gave a contact number with which the Hope Hospital got in touch with his family His aunt came to see him. Even his mother came from Bihar and was very happy to see him and to know that he was now undergoing treatment. On 15.06.2015 he rejoined his family and was discharged from Hope Hospital.

Success Story



This 10 year old girl was found at Sealdah Station by volunteers of Missionaries of Charity. At the time of her rescue her whole body was full of wounds which looked like a kind of fungal infection. She was admitted at Hope Hospital on 26.6.2015 where she underwent counselling. During one session she shared that her father is an alcoholic and that she was physically abused by her father and her mother. So she had left her house without telling her parents and reached Sealdah station by train. She was under care and treatment at Hope Hospital and her wounds slowly healed. As she was vulnerable on the streets and not at all safe in her house, she needed a protection home for her safety and rehabilitation.

Follow up: Date - 8.7.2015

Her wounds were healed. She was ready to be discharged. She was produced to CWC for a shelter and was subsequently rehabilitated at Mother and Child Care Unit of Hope Kolkata Foundation on 8.7.2015.

The Child Watch programme (including the Night Watch Service) is essentially a city based programme catering to the urban poor. The project covers the jurisdiction of Kolkata Police and the area covered comes under 70 police stations spanning the entire city. The project area runs through Tollygunge, Gariahat, Topsia, Dharmatala, Hastings, Howrah, Moulali, Sealdah, Howrah Bus and Train Station and Sealdah Station. However the programme also caters to individuals from outside Kolkata particularly the suburbs.

Child Watch was initiated after HOPE completed a situational analysis of its operational areas and evaluation of community needs and deprivations. This study revealed a continuing need to provide critical support to vulnerable children, living on the streets.

The Child Watch programme runs day rounds and night rounds to identify children in dangerous and neglectful situations. In the Day Watch Programme, the team conducts rounds, 3 days a week from 8:30am to 12 noon. In the Night Watch Programme, the team conducts night patrol, 5 nights a week from 10pm to 6am. They assist in detoxification of addicted children and identify children who have never been to school or are dropouts. They provide guidance and conduct follow ups on cases of child abuse, child labour and domestic violence to address the child's safety and overall holistic development.

Achievements

- 36 street children who have never been to school were admitted to school and have continued with their formal education throughout the year.
- 85 total cases of vulnerable children were identified; 24 cases were addressed through night rounds and 61 cases were supported through regular field visits during the day. Follow up visits were successfully conducted by the social workers of Child Watch team throughout the year to ensure that the children restored during the year were living in a safe and protective environment.
- The Child Watch team facilitated women in the community to form 15 Women Vigilance Groups. These groups stand against incidents of domestic violence, report incidents to social workers, support victims of violence and discuss ways of prevention.
- 14 Child Vigilance Committees with 75 children were successfully created. These committees help in creating a safe environment for children to speak of abuse and stand in solidarity with each other to fight it.
- 8 vulnerable children were rescued from the streets last year and 7 of them have been placed in a protective shelter. All the children were registered with Child line and the Child Welfare Committee ensuring legal procedures to assist their recovery and rehabilitation.
- After repeated rapport building sessions and meetings, the team convinced 7 shop keepers to stop selling addictive substances to minors.
- 4 addicted children were sent to detoxification centres.
- With the help of regular interventions and awareness 13 employers stopped employing children as waged labour.

Child Watch

Success Story



Sandeep (name changed) is a small boy who lived on the street, often spending hours alone and forced to fend for himself. He used to beg to survive and to ensure he had a single meal a day. The Police noticed him lying on the street with a head wound and informed the Night Watch team. He was admitted to HOPE Hospital after government hospitals would not admit him due to the extensive maggots in his wound. Sandeep was in a very poor condition and we feared for his life. With medical treatment and care, Sandeep recovered well in hospital and the team began to look at long term options for his care. Unfortunately Sandeep's parents are not able to take care of him. His father is an alcoholic and his mother is a psychiatric patient. Sandeep was placed in HOPE's Male Crisis Intervention Centre and is recovering well with continued medical and counselling support.

Success Story



Mita (name changed) has experienced terrible abuse and hardship at her young age and is now recovering gradually with the support of HOPE. When Mita's mother passed away her father showed no interest to care for her. This could have been because of the fact that she is a special child. She was abducted by a person who called himself her husband. She was abused and was forced into prostitution.

Thanks to the intervention of the local community, they were both taken into custody by the Police and the Police contacted HKF for Mita. Immediate medical treatment was sought for Mita at HOPE Hospital and the CWC and Child Line were informed. Mita worked with a HKF social

worker and when she could recall where she was from, she shared that she did not want to go back home. Mita is presently under the care and protection of Hope Kolkata Foundation and has found a home in our Crisis Intervention Centre (Female).

The Life Skills Unit aims to provide vocational training to young individuals from our Protection Homes and nearby slums. The main beneficiaries of these opportunities are adolescent girls and young women apart from the children we work with. This is so because women face discrimination across Kolkata and are often dependent on their male counterparts for income generation. The centre provides a fine opportunity to girls who are mostly drop outs with either Food service or Tailoring training using the Life skills infrastructure. This helps them with getting a job, earning money and allows them to live a life of dignity.

The Life Skills Training Institute delivers high-quality training to individuals that are unable to avail such services elsewhere due to the educational pre-requisites set by the Government of India. Professionally designed courses, which are tailored to suit the capabilities of the trainees, including technical skills and one-to-one intensive learning, helps them in learning a marketable skill. This is

complemented with a course certificate upon completion and a job placement, demonstrating how the institute operates as a stepping stone for trainees to wider work environments.

Food and Beverage Unit and Kitchen Skills Course

The training involves discussion of ingredients and preparation of each item on the menu. Compulsory spoken English classes are conducted to help the trainees communicate better with customers. Most of the trainees are school drop outs and do not have proper education. Therefore spoken English sessions help them to gain self-confidence. A volunteer teacher is dedicated to teaching the restaurant trainees English.

After learning and completing the course they are well acquainted with the importance of personal hygiene as well as in food preparation.

Hope Café (Food, beverage, culinary skills training unit)

The training involves discussion of ingredients and preparation of each item on the menu. Compulsory spoken English classes are conducted to help the trainees communicate better with customers. They brought him to the Life Skills Unit to learn Kitchen Skills. He proved to be adept in preparing vegetables for cooking as well as delivering food. At the end of his training he was placed at a prominent confectioners - Cakewali - at a monthly salary of INR 8000.

Success Story

Shreya (name changed) was found on the streets in UP as a bruised child by International Justice Mission. She was brought in their Mahima Home and was sent to our Life Skills Training Institute. She successfully completed her course and was

placed at Mio Amore outlet. Since then she has moved on and is in charge of a Café in one of the north east states of India.



Garment Manufacturing Course / Tailoring Unit

Taking into account the rise of specialised garment shop and boutiques in Kolkata, a need was felt for a training unit dedicated to fine tailoring. The tailoring training unit at Hope Life Skill Unit introduces learners to the functionality and operation of the tailoring machine and imparts training in designing patterns, making garments, stitching, embroidery, knitting and sewing.

The unit has a total capacity to accommodate 40 students for a year. The number is divided equally in two batches each with six months duration. A total of 241 tailoring classes were held in each of the 6 month sessions.

Production Unit

The production unit is running with 5 members, who have completed the garment construction course. They receive orders of school uniforms, female and male casual and formal garments, etc. The unit tries to keep the parameters of quality control and timeliness. Handcrafts, bags, cards for different occasions (birthday, devotional moments, wedding etc.), saris, jewellery boxes made with papers, diaries made with hand-made paper, etc. are manufactured and sold in the local market creating income for the women enabling them to support their families.

Achievements

- 6 networking visits with outside organizations were conducted and as a result a total of 22 trainees out of 40, for in the year 2016 have secured employment in different garment companies.
- 15 trainees received external support to enhance their mathematical aptitude and 17 trainees successfully received training for spoken English which helped to build their self-confidence.
- On an average 18 trainees received a monthly stipend based on their attendance to encourage them to attend classes and have a little pocket money. This can be taken as an introduction on finance management for them.

Success Story



Ishita (name changed) is a 32 years old woman, with two young children. Ishita studied up to Higher Secondary level in school but dropped out to look after her children as her husband worked in a local canteen. Ishita's neighbour informed her of HOPE's Tailoring Unit in the Life Skills Institute. She immediately applied for a trainee position as she had a great desire to learn tailoring. Ishita received excellent marks in her tailoring exams and was also a keen student in both Maths and English classes. She gained employment in Nirmal Nahata's Boutique after diligently finishing the course. This allowed her to significantly increase her family's income eventually. Ishita envisages putting her earning as an additional support towards her son's education, as he is just entering formal education.

Computer Training Centre

The computer training unit at the Hope Life skill Unit is supported by Blue dart – the renowned courier company. The courses encourage young girls and boys in the locality, who do not have access to a computer, to learn various computer training skills to better their future prospects.

In the last year a total of 96 enrolled successfully completed the computer course, which included basic and advanced lessons as well as a compulsory Spoken English course. A total of 241 computer classes were conducted which included both theory and practical sessions. Networking visits are organised with various agencies and offices for the placement of the unit's trainees.

Achievements

- In the last year a total of 96 enrolled successfully completed the computer course, which included basic and advanced lessons as well as a compulsory English course. All the trainees received certificates after completion of their course.
- The fact that unprivileged children have realized the importance and employability of technical education and how important basic computer skills are has been the biggest accomplishment of this project.
- 52 trainees gained successful placements and were able to improve their financial condition.
- Ten female trainees for the session of 2015-2016 have received scholarship of Rs 75,000/- for Computer Literacy from Novotel Hotels & Resorts.

Women empowerment and Income generation programme

This programme strives to help women who are victims of discrimination and make underprivileged, economically weak and vulnerable women financially, socially, emotionally and legally empowered through the formation of self help groups and income generation activities.

Accordingly, apart from providing livelihood opportunities, this project seeks to encourage a steady habit of savings amongst community people and provide social safety nets in an integrated way. Along with income generation and operationalisation of SHG model, skill enhancement training and capacity building approaches are important.
